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Anatomical connectivity of the visuospatial attentional network in schizophrenia: a DTI-based tractography study

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Background

- In healthy controls (HCs), the visuospatial attentional network consists of fronto-parietal bundles distributed across both hemispheres [1]. The anatomical organization of this network remains unexplored in patients with schizophrenia (SZPs).
- The aim of the present study was to determinate the white matter integrity (WM) and the volume of visuospatial attentional pathways in the right and left hemispheres (RH and LH), as well as their structural asymmetry in SZPs and HCs, using diffusion tensor imaging (DTI)-based tractography. We hypothesized that SZPs would have WM pathway alterations and reduced rightward structural asymmetry.





variable and group and hemisphere as independent factors were conducted. Gender was included as covariates, and the group × hemisphere interaction was tested. Post-hoc analyses used Tukey's HSD test.

- SLFII : HCs displayed a rightward asymmetry (P < 0.0001 for all values), for which they presented better integrity than SZPs (FA: P < 0.0001; RD: P = 0.0005; MD: P = 0.0059) (Figure).
- SLFIII : HCs and SZPs displayed a rightward asymmetry for FA (P < 0.0001 and P = 0.0042), but HCs presented better integrity than SZPs in the both RH and LH (P < 0.0001 respectively).
- There was no significant result for volume neither for diffusion values in the others tracts.

Discussion

- The results revealed a specific disruption of structural connectivity in the SLFII and a reduced rightward anatomical asymmetry of the fasciculus between the RH and LH in patients compared to HCs [2, 3], which could be the substrate of attentional deficits and alterations in visuospatial abilities that SZPs experience.
- The presents results provide new insights regarding the neuroanatomical basis of atypical visuospatial attentional network in schizophrenia and new understanding of how patients consider and process their visual world.
