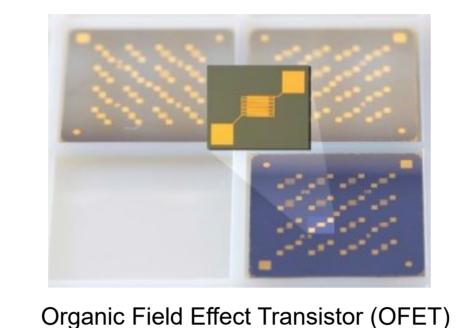
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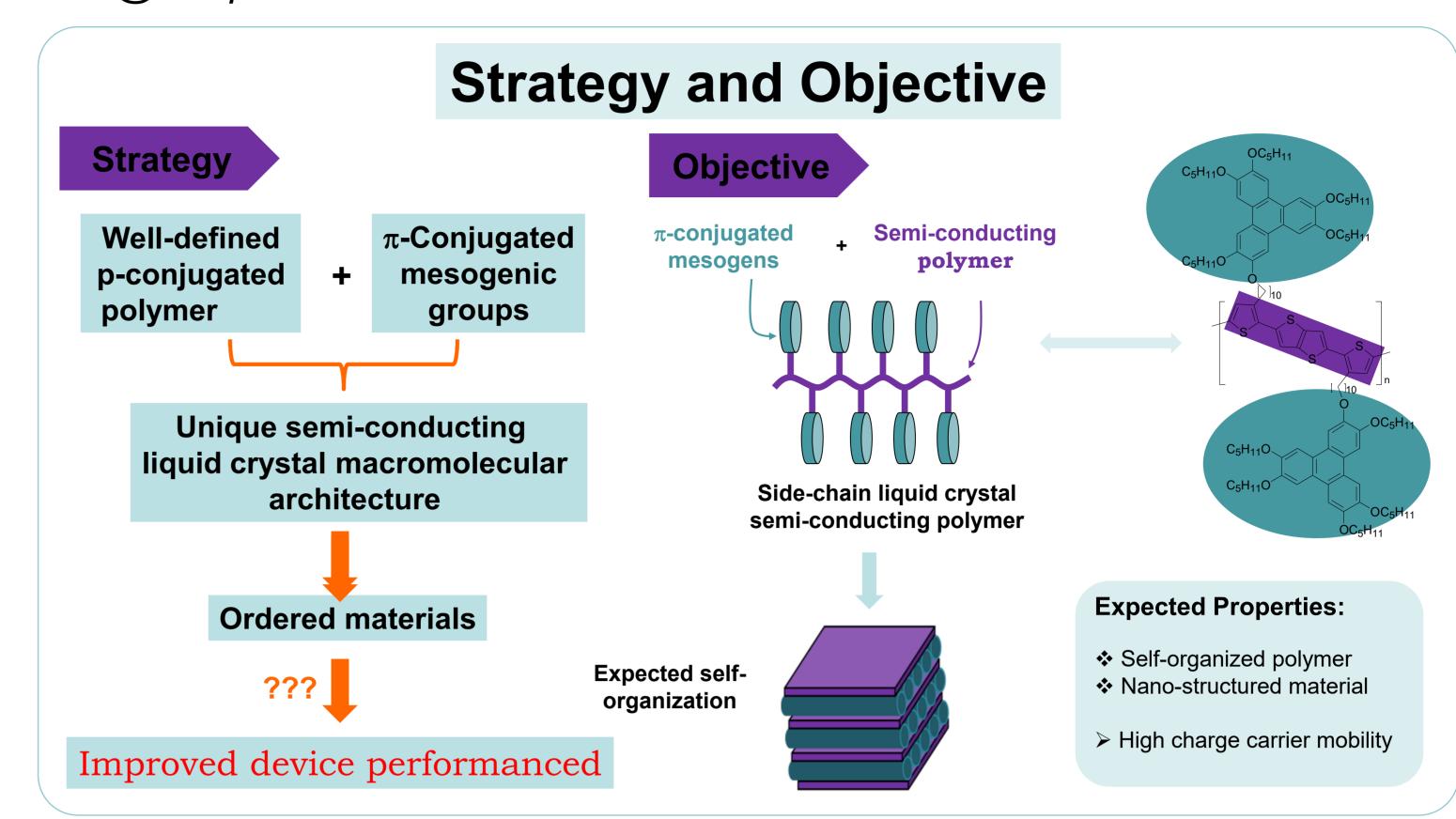
Introduction

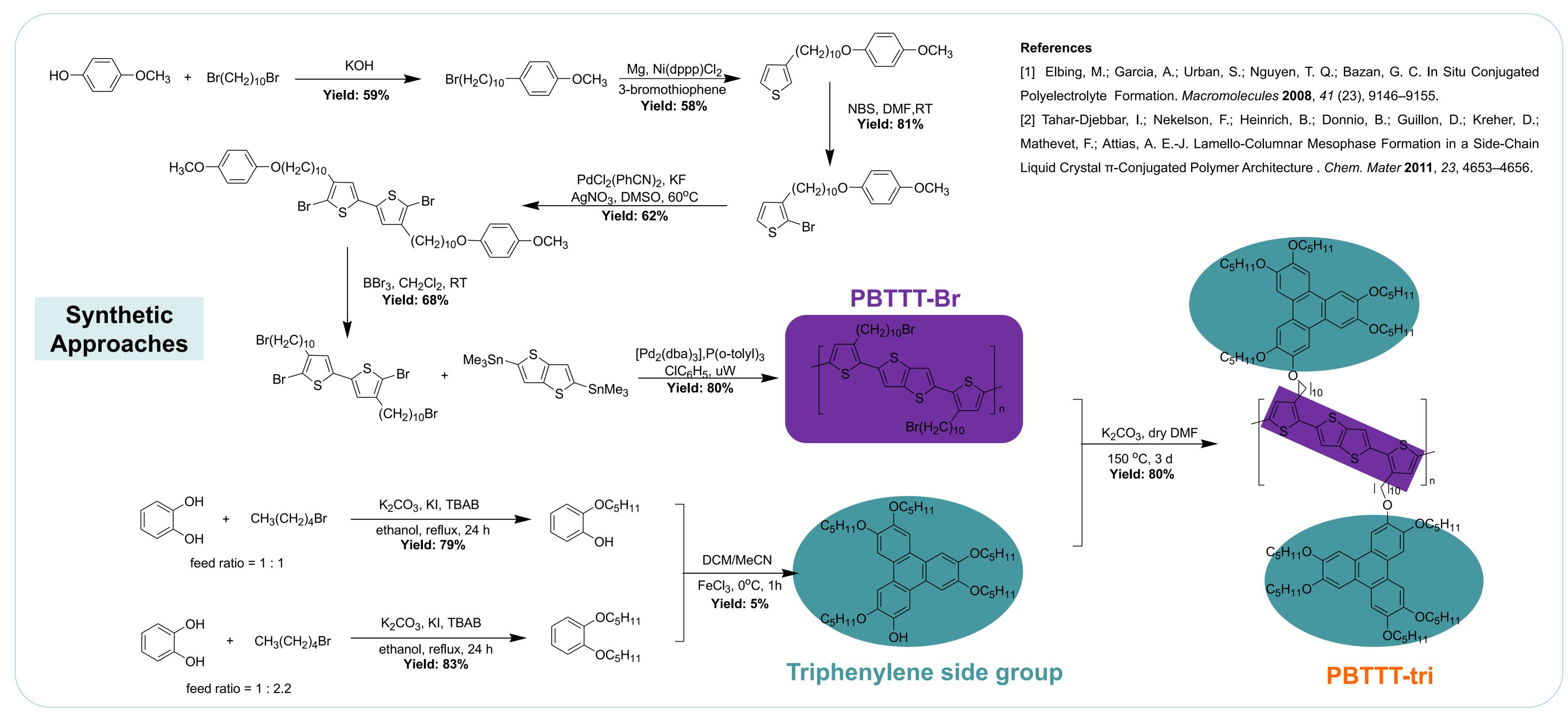
Semi-conducting materials have attracted much attention as they can be widely used as electronic devices, such as organic light emitting diodes (OLEDs), organic photovotalic cells (OPVs) and organic field effect transistors (OFETs). The biggest challenge to improve the device's performance is to get high charge carrier mobility. One promising solution is to prepare ordered materials. Therefore, in my project, we plan to prepare a semi-conducting polymer bearing a π-conjugated liquid crystal side group, hoping that this polymer will be able to self-organize and as a result exhibit high charge carrier mobility.



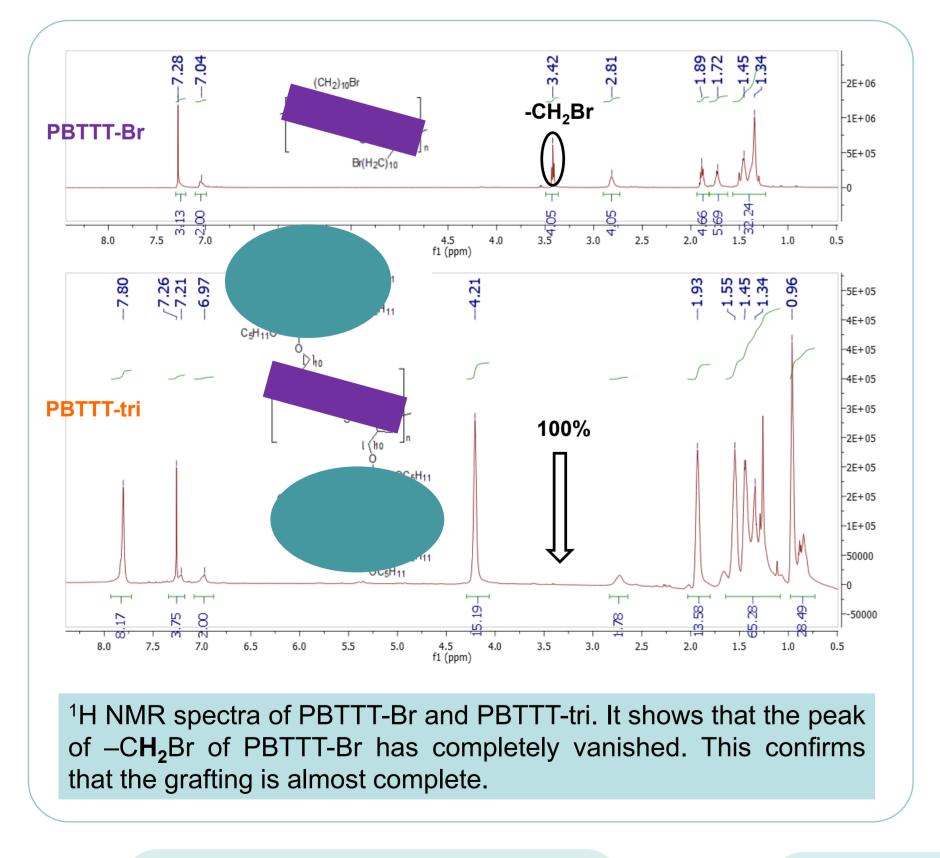




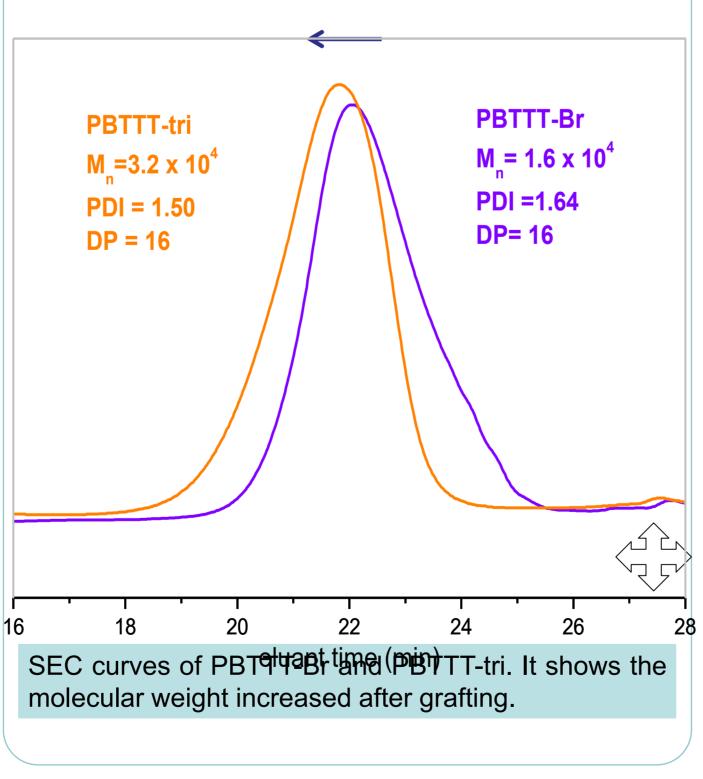




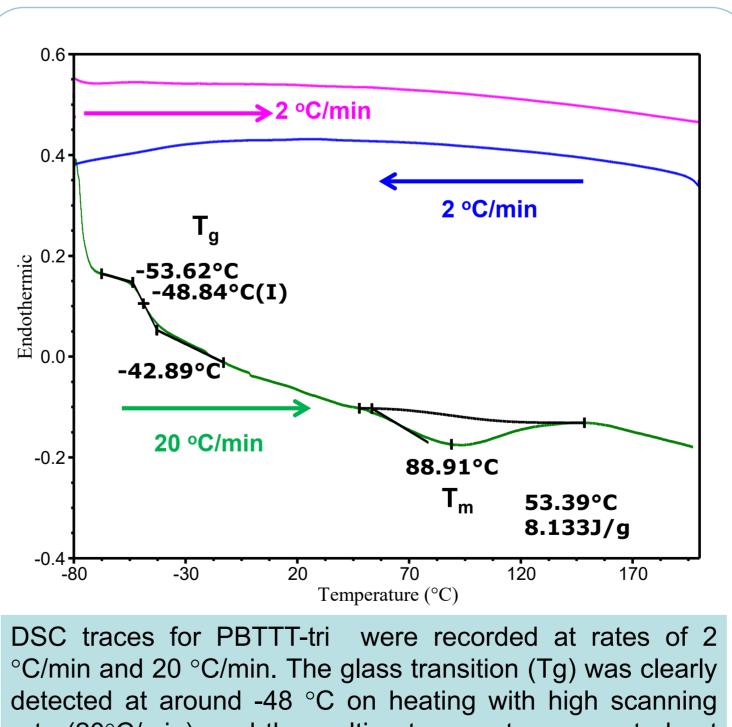

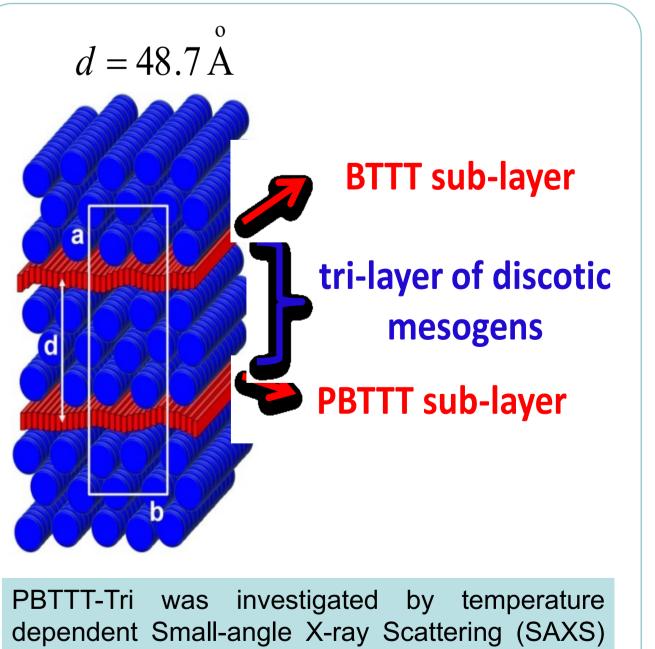

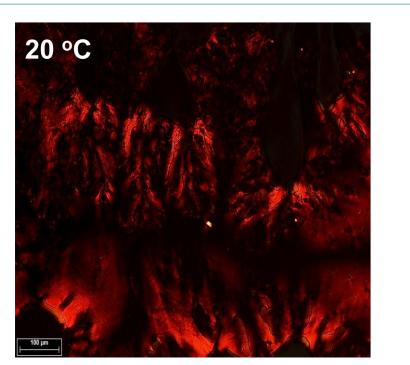

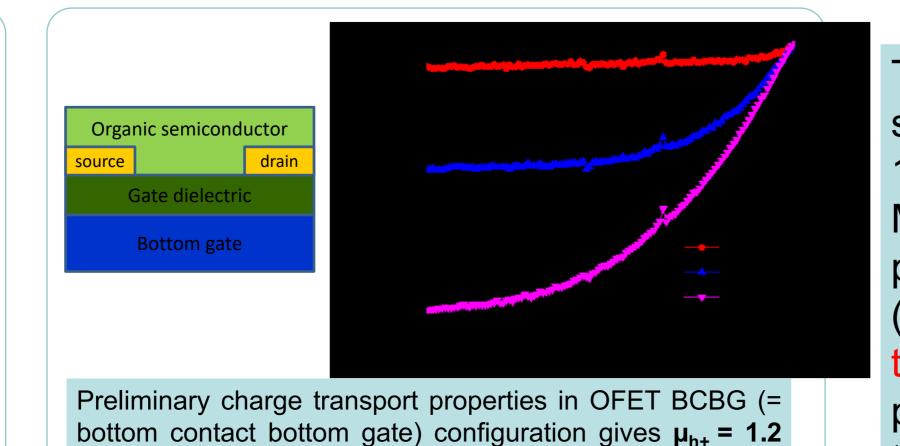

Conclusion

The obtained polymer (PBTTT-Tri) was synthesized via a post-functionalization strategy. Before to be characterized by appropriate analytical techniques (1H NMR, 13C NMR and SEC). Then its thermal behavior was studied by Polarized Optical Microscopy (POM) and Differential Scanning Calorimetry (DSC). The self-organization property of PBTTT-Tri was also investigated by temperature dependent (SAXS) and (GIWAXS). We evidenced this material presents a lamellar-columnar arrangement that can be oriented on surfaces. Moreover, the preliminary charge transport properties of PBTTT-Tri in thin films were examined in OFET configuration, and a ptype conduction with a hole mobility around 1.2 x 10⁻⁵ cm² V⁻¹ s⁻¹ was observed.
