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# In vitro characterization of the mucoadhesive properties of tablets in stomach and intestinal LAGEP environments

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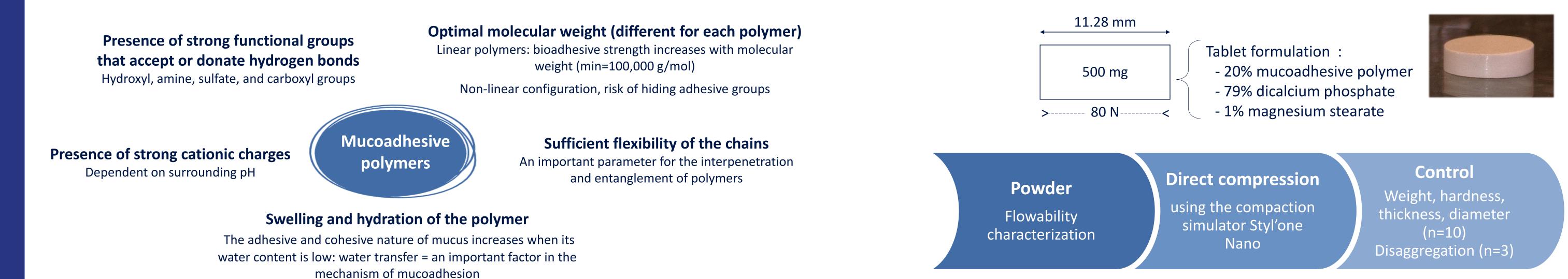
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The aim of this study is to develop mucoadhesive tablets able to target a specific region of the gastro-intestinal tract (GIT) and suitable as a drug delivery system. For this purpose, the mucoadhesive properties of tablets made of different polymers have been studied in two model media mimicking stomach and intestine environments, respectively. Several tablet characterization techniques have been used and/or developed to determine their disintegration time, swelling index and interactions with mucosa by measuring a detachment strength and an adhesion time.

 $\rightarrow$  Six polymers exhibiting one or more of the characteristics described above were selected for this study.



ADHESION CHARACTERIZATION METHODS

## **1) Swelling evaluation**

**Objective** : determine the **hydration capacity** of the formulation, the first key step in the adhesion mechanism

Assessment of swelling by mass monitoring: The tablets are pre-weighed before being placed in the medium, then reweighed after being taken and lightly wiped with absorbent paper to remove surface water.

## 2) Measurement of the detachment force

**Objective:** Measure the **tensile strength required for** rupture, as well as the work of adhesion.

> **1- Tablet hydration:** 10min in SGF or SIF

Synthetic mucosa: Gel: 0.5% agar and 4.5% mucins<sup>1</sup>

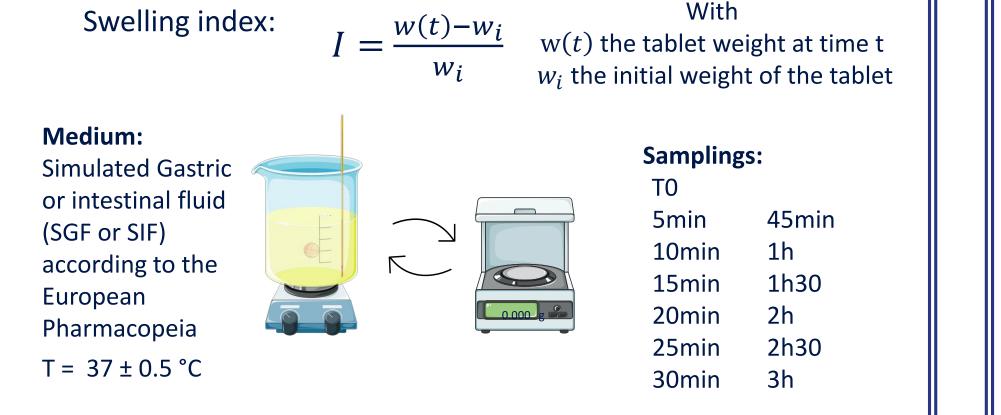
### 3) Adhesion time measurement

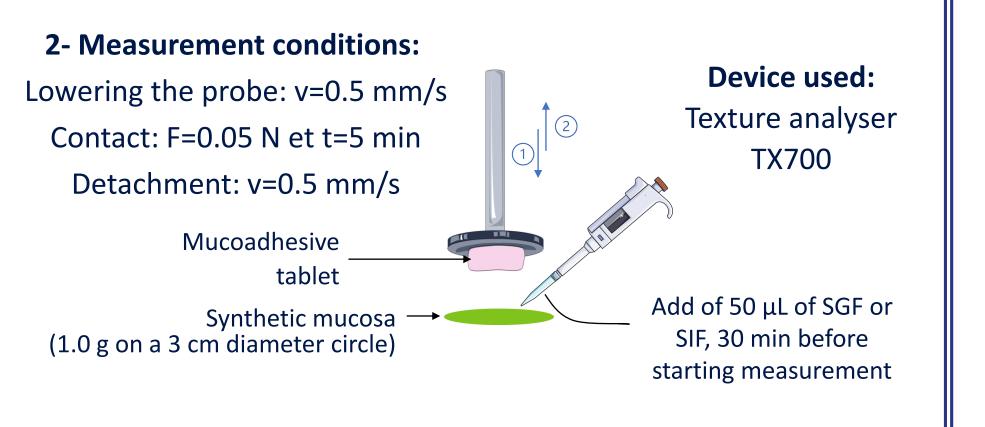
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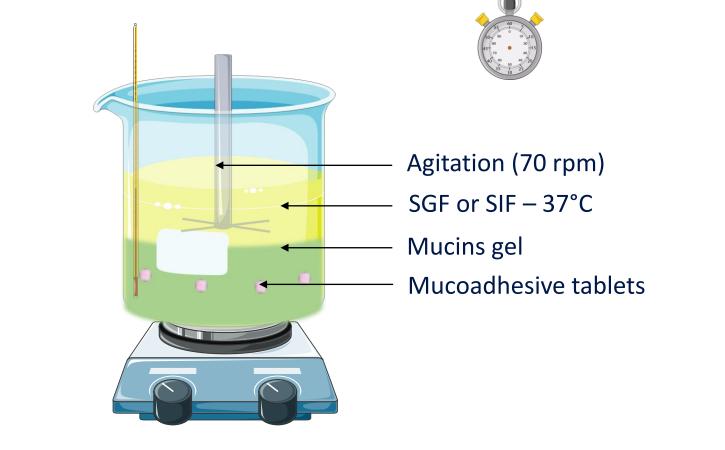

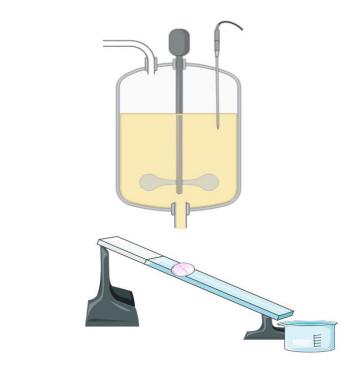

# CONCLUSION

#### 4) Discussion

- Good correlation between the different tests
- Crosslinked polymers present lower mucoadhesion properties
- Polymers with several functional groups that donate hydrogen bond present good mucoadhesion properties
- More than swelling, gelation seems to be a critical parameters
- Implementation of a set-up to characterise spontaneous adhesion of tablets to a synthetic mucosa and after immersion in a medium representative of *in vivo* conditions

This study enabled the implementation of robust characterization methods to identify the mucoadhesive properties of tablets in vitro. Moreover, it enabled to highlight mucoadhesive properties of tablets made of different polymers widely used in pharmaceutical applications. It also allowed to learn more about the mechanism of mucoadhesion and the interactions between polymers and mucins, as well as the effect of pH on this complex phenomenon.

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
