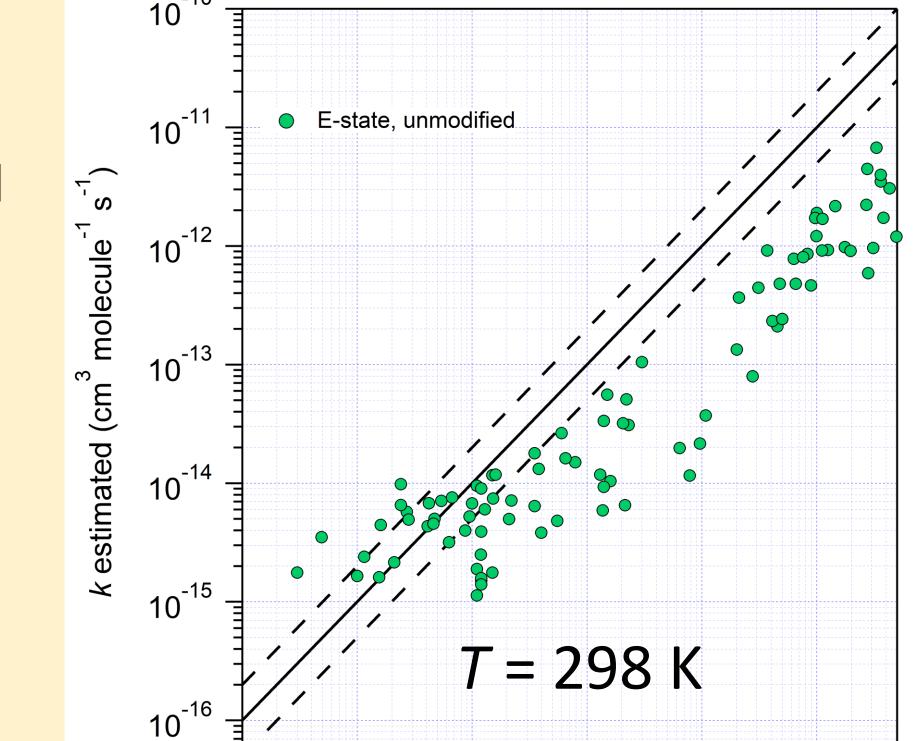
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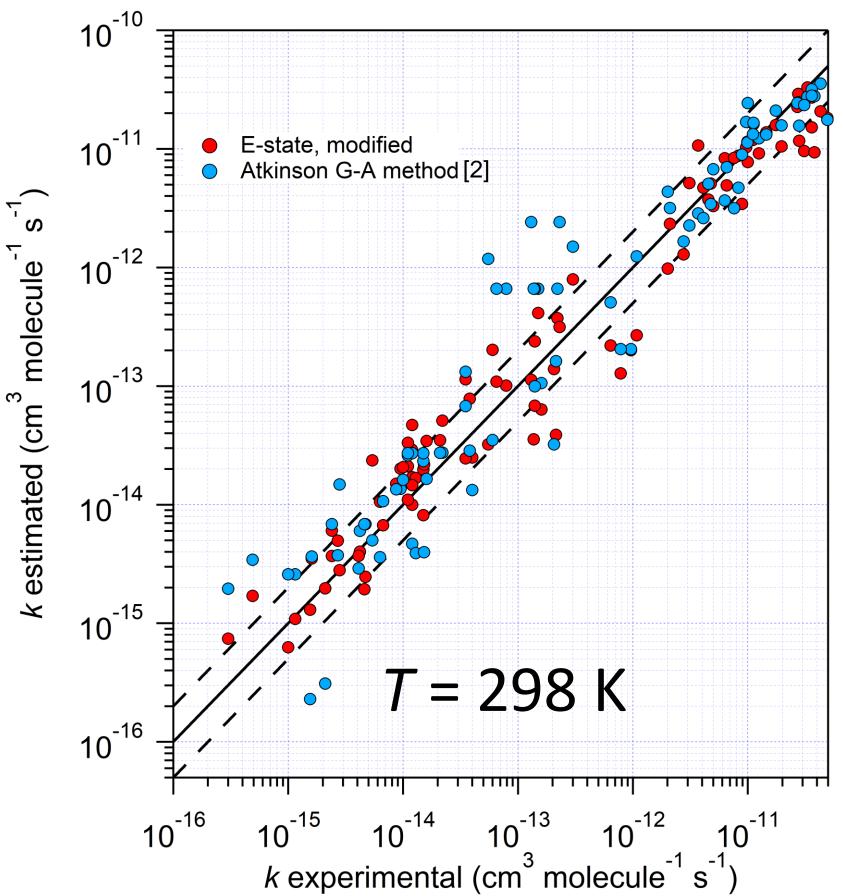
## The E-state method

• The electrotopological state (E-state) is a new method for estimating T-dependent, site-specific OH rate coefficients [1]:





• Without modification, the E-state underestimates  $k_{OH}$ for alkyl ethers and overestimates  $k_{OH}$  for halogenated ethers

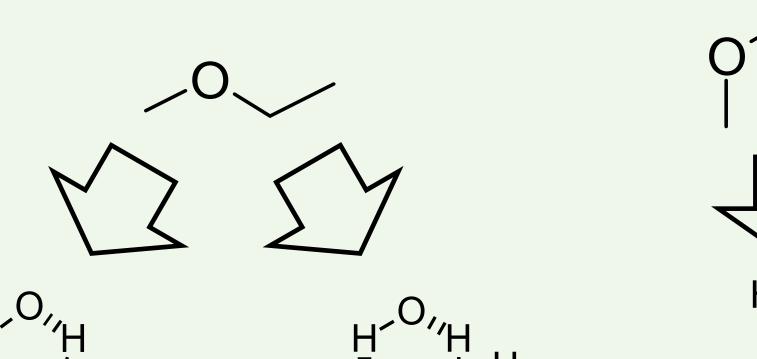


- It is based on a fundamental property of sites within molecules
- So far, it has been applied to the alkanes and haloalkanes
- Can it be applied to the more complex oxygenated molecules?
- Here, we will test with etheric compounds: ethers and halogenated ethers with one or more ether linkages (N = 93 molecules)

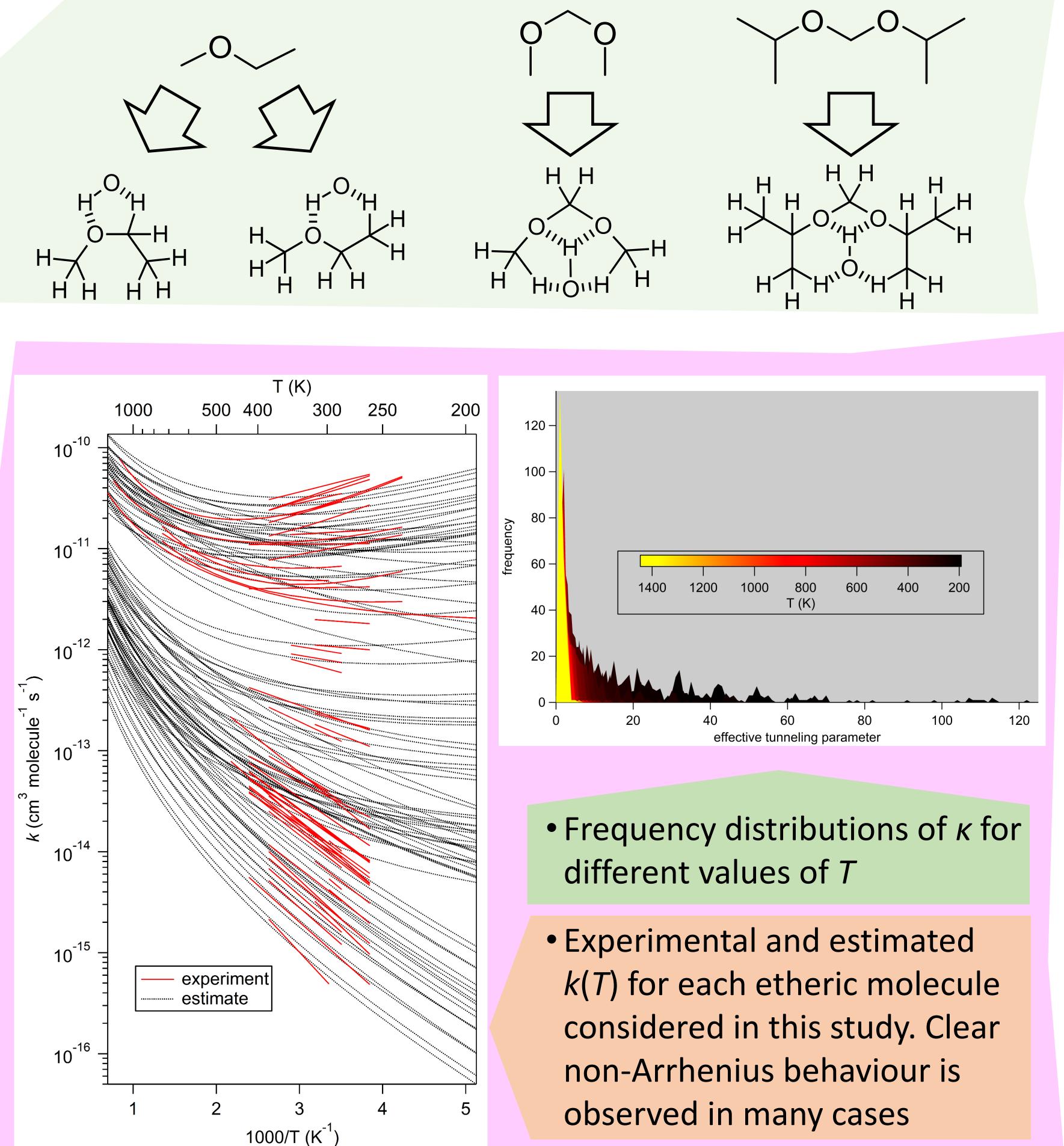
# vdW complexes

• Pre-reactive complexes may explain the reactivity

• By parameterizing the capacity of a molecule to form van der Waals complexes, we obtain a much better performance



k experimental (cm<sup>3</sup> molecule<sup>-1</sup> s<sup>-1</sup>)



and negative/ non-Arrhenius temperature dependence of ethers at lower temperatures • We consider 5- and 6-membered cyclic complexes • Larger rings are possible, but entropy may limit size • Ultimately, this leads to a multiplicative correction to the original E-states algorithm that we define as kappa, κ, the effective tunnelling parameter:

$$k_{total}(T) = \sum_{i} \kappa_i A_i \exp(-B_i/T)(T/300)^{n_i}$$

# **Multi-ring systems?**

- Multiple ring parameterizations may apply where several ether linkages are present
- This concept is parameterized to improve the predictions for these compounds

## The effect of temperature

- As would be expected, the effect of hydrogenbonded vdW complexes decreases with temperature • A simple exponential function is employed to
- describe this
- κ can enhance rate coefficients >100 times at lower T •  $\kappa \rightarrow 1$  as T approaches 1000 K

### **Conclusions and next steps**

- The initial E-state parameterization was trained on alkanes and haloalkanes
- This parameterization was retained and augmented with a multiplicative correction to describe vdW
- The results are convincing for etheric molecules, and will be extended to other oxygenates
- Open, Python-based software will be upgraded to include these new aspects
