Summaries

The main aim and objective of the Action is to

EarlyMuse intends to chart new paths that will strengthen the unique place of early music in Europe. It will therefore be a matter of confronting the challenges that arise from different vantage points: (1) scientific, (2) educational, (3) structural and professional, (4) economic and societal.

During its first two years the Action progressed the achievement of this as described below

EarlyMuse fostered the development of a geographically inclusive community focused on historical musicology. It addressed topics related to scientific practices (WG Publications), the status of the discipline in higher education and research (WG Education), the modes of deploying shared tools (WG Sources), and the relationships with the field of research-creation (WG Performance). Finally, it aimed to raise awareness within its community about European issues and to consider ways to engage with public policymakers (WG Policies).

Now bringing together 263 members from 39 countries, EarlyMuse has organized its activities around meetings and short scientific missions that have strengthened connections among researchers from diverse backgrounds. These activities have resulted in publications, most of which are freely accessible on EarlyMuse's own website. They have also invited researchers to combine their efforts to engage with other EU initiatives (Creative Europe, European Cloud for Cultural Heritage, Marie Curie Network).

The next two years, 2025 and 2026, will transform the reflections and investigations of 2023 and 2024 into concrete outputs: articles, notes, policy briefs, and reports. There is no real danger, but there is an obligation to remain vigilant in order to listen to as many voices as possible, thereby strengthening collective initiatives to move beyond the fundamentally individualistic conception of the discipline.

The Rapporteur summarised the Action's major outcomes, impacts and successes as follows

I continue to be deeply impressed at the scope, depth, and quality of the thinking that has gone into EarlyMuse.

Novel technologies of inscription have always complicated the relationship between authors and readers. This is especially true of the performing art of music. From the beginnings of western musical notation a millennium ago, to the advent of the printing press (around 1500), to sound recording about a century ago, new technologies of transcription and reproduction brought about means for controlling the effects and purposes of music, even inaugurating a new sense of it as intellectual property. Each was a new medium of its day, and each brought with it new ways for composers, performers, and listeners to interact around musical ideas.

Now the digital domain dominates our encounter with music, exploding notions of genre, history, and ownership in ways that we have yet to fully comprehend. The digital turn can nevertheless help us understand in particular what we call Early Music—that period of musical history in which the notion of a music 'book' in the modern sense was something quite different from what we know today. Digital texts can help us imagine a time before the great collected editions and genre-bound monuments in our libraries, replacing them with layered, dynamic texts that exist (as they did five hundred years ago) in their variants.

Digital tools also help us connect text and context in new ways, immersing music once again in a network of places, objects, people, and ideas that gave it meaning then, and allow us to make meaning from it now. These methods, in brief, are helping us make old music new again, putting the study and practice of music into deeper conversation with each other. The field of musicology confronts these developments in particular ways on account of its unique system of symbolic notation. But no scholar of the period (and no practicing musician) can afford to ignore the possibilities of the digital turn. It is already transforming our work and teaching, through new kinds of archives, new modes of reading and analysis, and through the new pedagogies upon which scholarship and performance will increasingly depend.



The Action Chair has described their plans for addressing issues identified in their report as follows

There is no real danger as such, but constant attention must be paid to ensure geographical balance, the contribution of young researchers, and gender balance. A junior researcher from Croatia has been appointed to inform us on gender equality issues within our action and also beyond, in the professional sector.

This seems a good plan for this important work. I have personally been impressed at the wide range of scholars involved in the work.

Scientific dissemination and clustering. The aim is to publish studies that will nourish the public debate while allowing the emergence of new paradigms to address the political dimension of early music, and beyond any form of music through the methodology that will be implemented.

The publication of joint works first required a phase of network facilitation. By the end of the second year, EarlyMuse had indeed published an article in an international journal and made numerous reports available as open access on its website. However, it was only during the most recent meetings that the network's potential and the necessity to work prospectively for the future of the disciplinary field became clear.

Based on the paper cited, the WG seems to be making solid progress, in my view. The institutional and practical aspects of this WG are no less complex than the musical scores that are the object of publication in the first place. The Zagreb and Malaga meetings were clearly productive, and I expect that a platform of best practices will be shared with stakeholders (publishers, libraries, cultural institutions, scholars and performers) in the months ahead. I have no concerns.

General Assessment of MoU objectives

The level of ambition of the MoU objectives is **High**.

From a scientific perspective, EarlyMuse has begun to identify new directions for the future of musicological research. By focusing on publication methods and approaches to sources, the involved researchers have identified avenues that have been published in a peer-reviewed journal and in reports that are widely distributed. This work is too recent to quantitatively measure its impact. At most, the metrics concerning the article published in a journal indicate a genuine interest from researchers. EarlyMuse aims to tackle two economic challenges. The first concerns the future methods of publication, and the second involves the conditions for a dialogue between musicology and the cultural and creative industries. For the first, milestones have been set, and feedback will be assessed once a statement paper is published (before the end of 2024). On the societal level, the impacts will be measurable once the work on the professional sector is completed and when the new mode of dissemination for musicological research is established. The first point is crucial as it would allow for the inclusion of the 'musicology' sector in OECD statistics. Starting in October 2024, EarlyMuse has appointed a leader for gender issues. A young researcher from Croatia will oversee this central theme, particularly with regard to academic careers.	Societal	Foreseen by the end of the Action		

Validity, relevance and significance (in particular importance and timeliness) of the impact reported by the Action: Equity for all scholars is vitally important, and I applaud this initiative. I am confident that their report will raise awareness and lead to action.

The extent to which the Action has advanced the careers, skills and networks of researchers including ECIs (as described by the Action) is **very good**.

Stakeholder engagement

The most important stakeholders to be engaged thus far include REMA, RISM, and RILM. With REMA we have organized STSMs and we have joined in two REMA meetings. In November 2024 we will have a leadership meeting with REMA and also the European Association of Conservatories to establish roadmaps for educational cooperation. RISM has hosted STSMs; representatives from RISM have joined various WG meetings to help shape the nature of our cooperation. RILM has similarly been present at WG meetings and involved in working with WG 3 on the challenges of editions in the digital age. In the future, we intend to engage other stakeholders in the international nonprofit field, including organizations that are actively working toward shaping EU cultural policy. We have already made initial contact with the European Music Council, Culture Action Europe and Europa Nostra at events that they have hosted in Brussels and elsewhere. We intend to organize meetings with them by 2026 to establish partnerships that can outlast this Action.

Emerging topics / developments in the field of the Action

The Action reported the following emerging topics / developments in the field of the Action.

• An important emerging theme is the role of musicological research--and our object of study, music--in the development of the European Cloud for Heritage. As the most important type of intangible heritage, musical heritage presents many opportunities for innovating methods and technologies in the Cloud. Yet there are many challenges as well, ranging from the copyright issues related to audiovisual recordings, to the continued challenges of Optical Music Recognition, to the most sustainable and accurate way to create a digital twin of a fragmentary musical score. Yet we are not the only field to be busy with these questions of intangible heritage, and we could imagine that the technological and philosophical issues associated with "recording" intangible heritage could be fruitful terrain for S&T Conferences or Exploratory Workshops bringing together humanists and technologists, for example.

The Action Rapporteur made the following comment on the emerging topics / developments in the field reported by the Action.

Music has always been mediated by its technologies of recording and reproduction, and so it seems particularly important that reflective, systematic work on this take place now.
