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Making research results openly available is not an afterthought when the project is over, but, rather, it is an effective way of doing the research itself.

Open Science is the practice of science in such a way that others can collaborate and contribute, where research data, lab notes and other research processes are freely available, under terms that enable reuse, redistribution and reproduction of the research and its underlying data and methods.

Benefits of Open Science

EFFICIENCY

Increase research efficiency (avoid duplication of research, more results with the same data, more participation in the work.

KNOWLEDGE

Enables the creation of new research questions.

QUALITY & INTEGRITY

wider evaluation and scrutiny by the scientific community.

VISIBILITY

Share your work and make it more visible.

COLLABORATION

International, better understanding of challenges requiring coordinate efforts at a large scale.

ECONOMIC BENEFITS

Reduce publishing costs, value creation through innovation.

What is Open Access (OA)?

H2020 => Online access to scientific information that is:

- free of charge to the end-user
- reusable

Scientific information:

- peer-reviewed scientific research articles
- research data

H2020 OA mandate for publications



All peer-reviewed scientific publications related to results (including monographs and book chapters) must be:

- deposited in a **repository** (even for if in a OA journal already)
- in the form of a **machine readable electronic copy**
- the published **version** or the final peer-reviewed manuscript accepted for publication
- as **soon** as possible
- with identifying metadata

Open access costs eligible for reimbursement when the project runs.

Publications: routes to Open Access





- Limited pilot launched in 2014, in 2017
 - participating is the default option for all projects (opt out possible)
- Develop a Data Management Plan (DMP)
- Provide open data (if possible)
 - for (meta)data needed to validate results
 - other (meta)data curated or raw data specified in the DMP

As open as possible, as closed as necessary!



ERC specificities for publications

• ERC rules closely aligned to the H2020 requirements (cf. MGA 29.2) expected: data underlying Publications

HORIZON 2020

- Disciplinary or institutional repositories recommended
- Embargo extended to 12 months if pub. linked to SSH (upon request)
- Metadata: lighter requirements for bibliographic metadata
 - but PID mandatory (DOI)
 - \circ $\,$ Good practice: ERC grant number indicated in metadata $\,$
- Open license encouraged (CC BY)



ERC specificities for research data

Slightly different 29.3 (data): opt-in to the ORD pilot optional

- Data management must follow the FAIR principles
- Submit the first version of a DMP within 6 months specific template for ERC
- Deposit data mentioned in the DMP in a trusted (certified) repository
- Exceptions acceptable if it would jeopardise any objective (not just main)

HORIZON 2020

- Opt-out: no justification needed
- Recommended: Information and tools used for the validation of the results



Ultimately, it is for the individual investigator to decide which data merit conservation and/or sharing.

- All publications including monographs and book chapters
- Always deposit in Open repository
- A PID is required



Data

- Degrees of data sharing
- Needs Research Data Management compliant with the FAIR principles
- Don't forget to: think about tools/infos needed to validate results

What is data?

Definitions vary based on the research community or discipline, legal context, data governance policies...

It's impossible to frame them as a fixed ontological category... especially in the Humanities.

=> Everything that is produced in a research process (but not administrative of pedagogical outputs)

Publications are arguments made by authors,

FINDABLE To aid automatic discovery of relevant datasets

ACCESSIBLE

Explicit limitations on the use of data, protocols for querying, downloading or copying data are made explicit for both humans and machines

INTEROPERABLE

(Meta)data should use standards, have references to other (meta)data and be machine actionable

REUSABLE

(Meta)data are sufficiently well described for humans and computers to be able to understand them and have a clear and accessible data usage licence

FINDABLE

Mobilizing the Post for a Digital Future: The Potential of Digital Archaeology Data Management Plan

Types of Data The data produced by this proposed project will include presentations given by participants and data generated from moderated discussions in the proposed workshop. Presentations will consist of image entations, video recording, and text files documenting a multidisciplinary two-day workshop on establishing best practices and protocols for mobile computing in digital archaeology. Dialogue and discussion generated during and after the workshop is an additional source of data. A website will be generated by the project team to publicize the event; post text, video, and graphic images from the event; post best practice and protocol documents generated after the event; and continue to post discussion generated after the workshop. A project white paper and final report will be produced for the NEH.

Data Standards and Capture

The Creighton Divital Repository (CDR) has committed to providing a stable and secure digital archive indefinitely in order to store, preserve, and make accessible the data generated from the proposed workshop using DSpace. Data for this project consists of documents related to the organization running, and follow up on the two-day workshop. Project directors in coordination with the CDR will upload event promotional material, and practical information for attendees and participants, as well as the presentations (rest and PowerPoint) sideo and discussion from the workshop itself. After the workshop, continuing discussion, and best practice and protocol documents will be uploaded by project directors and participants. Wentworth Institute of Technology has committed to providing audio and video recording of workshop events; these will be captured as uncompressed audio or video but will be converted and maintained in the form of widely-adopted open formats such as MP4 that are suitable for events will be live-streamed Effort will be made to use

The advent of the internet and ability of researchers to move data easily, and facilities to extract data from documents or databases, has introduced a new problem when defining the origin of the data. In a multidisciplinary/multi-institutional scenario, it is often difficult to determine the origins of the data collected, compiled and archived in a central repository. To facilitate the process of tracing the origin of data, sensors or process used and transformations (if any) and allow the validation of scientific databases, the use of metadata standards will be imposed. Data provenance is central in the validation of data and as such, no data will be archived in RDb and served to the public unless data provenance is addressed. The RDb will maintain its integrity and reliability when the process used to create them are reproducible and analyzable for defects.

5. DATA PROVENANCE AND METADATA

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Step 1: What is a DMP?

A DMP is a brief plan, formalised in a document, to define:

- how the data will be created
- how it will be documented
- who will be able to access it
- where it will be stored
- who will back it up
- whether (and how) it will be shared & preserved

Step 1: DMP Timeline

The DMP is a living document:

- initial DMP within first 6 months
- updated DMP
 - for significant changes
 - \circ or periodical reviews
- final DMP

- Other data: everything needed to find, asses, understand, reuse data:

 - \circ code

Step 3: Deposit Data

PLANNED PREPARATION (with the DMP)

- Standard file formats
- Standards metadata schemas
- Documentation: what do others need to understand your data?
- (Open) Licences

Preparing data for sharing

Embedded documentation

- code, field and label description
- descriptive headers or summaries
- information recorded in the file properties (IPTC images, word doc)

Supporting documentation

- Working papers, blog posts, field notebooks
- Questionnaires, interview guides
- Final project reports
- Catalogue metadata

Opening and sharing your data is not just about compliance: they are strategic decisions.

The ERC lets you decide what to share and how, but expects you to provide the necessary metadata and documentation that will make it most useful!
