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MODELLING OF NANOFIBRILLATION PROCESS OF CRYSTALLINE DISENTANGLED POLYMERS

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Contexte

This PhD work is carried out at the Processes and Engineering in Mechanics and Materials laboratory (**PIMM**) in collaboration with the Centre of Molecular and Macromolecular Studies (CMMS), Łódź, Poland and is dealing with the processing of nanocomposite. CMMS developed a promising nanofibrillation processing route based on the **plastic deformation of crystalline disentangled polymers**. In order to further our understanding of the phenomena taking place during the process we resort to **computational modelling**. Due to the **very large deformations** involved, the Constrained Natural Element Method (**CNEM**) is used to simulate the nanofibrillation process.

Disentangled Polytetrafluoroethylene

Crystallisation is the best for preserving disentanglement



Disentangled Polymer \Rightarrow Reduced macromolecular/physical entanglement \Rightarrow Negligible strain hardening, hence enabling very large plastic deformation ($\lambda \simeq 100.000$)

Constitutive equation and plasticity model

Local equation of the molten matrix polymer dynamics : with : $\sigma = -p\mathbf{I} + 2\eta \mathbf{D} \rightarrow$ Incompressible and Newtonian fluid $div(\sigma) + \mathbf{f}_{d} = \rho \gamma$ $div(\mathbf{v}) = 0$

Constitutive equation of the plastic deformation of an inclusion by dislocation $slip^6$:



Computational approach

The Constrained Natural Element Method (**CNEM**) is an extension of the Natural Element Method $(NEM)^7$

- Based on a field interpolation like the Finite Element method (FEM),
- Used interpolation function : function of *natu*ral neighbour type (ex : Sibson or Laplace function),

The shear rate is formulated as a function of the resolved shear stress, τ^{α} and the critical resolved shear stress (CRSS) of each slip system, τ_c^{α} $\dot{\gamma}^{\alpha} = f(\tau^{\alpha}, \tau_{c}^{\alpha})$ with τ_{c}^{α} obtained experimentally.

Resolved shear stress τ produced on slip system α by an applied force F

- \Rightarrow Quality of the solution independent of the quality of the mesh,
- \Rightarrow The mesh is modify at each iteration,
- \Rightarrow Meshless method for finite deformation framework.

Modelling of nanofibrillation sheared by a viscous polymer matrix

We are going to model the nanofibrillation process of **disentangle PTFE** sheared by **viscous molten polymer matrix of PS** for three experimental setups :

- Single monomolecular crystal plastically sheared by viscous molten polymer matrix,
- Polycristalline inclusions plastically sheared by viscous molten polymer matrix,
- Multiple inclusions plastically sheared by viscous molten polymer matrix.

These models depend on multiple parameters.

Experimental parameters :

- -CRSS of each PTFE slip system,
- Elastic moduli of PTFE,
- Temperature,
- $T_{\text{softening}}(PS) = 170^{\circ}C < T < T_{\text{melting}}(PTFE) = 327^{\circ}C$
- —Shear rate,
- Time,
- Capillary number :
- $Ca = \frac{\tau R}{\sigma} = \frac{\dot{\gamma} \eta R}{\sigma}$ with $\frac{\sigma}{R}$ surface tension, R diameter of the inclusion

- —Numerical implementation of crystal viscoplasticity framework within CNEM,
- —Modelling the nanofibrillation process via viscous shearing for disentangled polymer,
- Development of a numerical predictive tool for the nanofibrillation process.

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
